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Epiphany: Wedding at Cana

Isaiah 62.1-5 Psalm 36.5-10 | Corinthians | 12.1-11 | John 2.1-11

An Epiphany. A moment of sudden and great revelation and realization. And we find ourselves in the season named after this word. And this is a word that is so very apt for the themes of this time in the church year that follows and indeed adds to the most wonderful time of the year that is Christmas.

For this is a season where we have heard of a star leading those from lands afar to a child hence revealed as King of all the nations. A season where we hear of heavens opened and the dove like Holy Spirit descending on a young man declared to be the beloved Son of God by God themselves. And a season where miracles are recalled to further sure up the truth that the baby we celebrate being born at Christmas is none other than God made flesh.

The miracle of the conversion of water into wine at the wedding at Cana is one that may be thought of as an obvious choice to recall when thinking of things that point to the truth that Jesus was and is Emmanuel, God with us. For here we have an event that ticks that crucial box that one must surely wish to see filled in when it comes to a miracle, and especially during the season of Epiphany. For here what is revealed is the huge and amazing abundance of God, as six stone jars of water, of twenty to thirty gallons capacity, are converted into the juice of the grape.

That this is a ludicrous amount of wine for Jesus to produce is widely accepted. It is more by far than would have been needed to quench the thirst of the invited guests throughout the whole wedding meal, never mind tide them over as proceedings draw to a close. This is not some cheap plonk either. This is good stuff, as agreed by the chief steward, a man who we can assume knows a fair bit about what makes up a decent wine list. Certainly, it is better than he is expecting to give to a load of people who are already pretty well pickled in what has been flowing from carafes at the banquet.

Here then is a true miracle. Or a true sign as John calls it. A sign that in Jesus the huge and amazing power of God is revealed. Power that overflows and over-runs anything that can be expected, and can only come from a God whose love is so great that they created all things, love all things, and save all things. So yes, this event then truly reveals that Jesus is nothing short of divine.

And yet another reason that this sign is the one chosen for this season of revelation must be that it is the start of these miraculous divine occurrences, the first of the signs that show the glory of Jesus as stated in John's Gospel. The reason that this miracle sits so well in this time of Epiphany, and after the great feast of the incarnation that is Christmas, is that it is one that speaks so much into the human as well as the divine. For here we are introduced to the human side of Jesus and more, we are shown how humanity reacts to the actions of God.

That this miracle is one that sees Jesus seeming to do little more than indulge those who have already shamefully indulged themselves with alcohol causes the faces of some of those of faith to go as red as the wine produced at Cana, such is their embarrassment.

And yet as with all those other stories we can think of from the Gospels where Jesus shares meals with people, this miracle shows at the least that Christ wishes for life to be a thing of joy and celebration for the people that he encounters and that he wants these people to be satisfied. And furthermore, it shows that God wants to be a part of bringing joy to those lives.

But there is more that goes beyond even this. For this is a miracle that is performed to help people in need. That the bride and groom have really dropped the ball in running out of wine to celebrate their nuptials is no understatement. Shame and even talk of bad omens for their future would have been the result if such under-catering had become known by those gathered for their big day.

This miracle can be added then to other occasions when Christ shows compassion for those who are in need. And in this is revealed a God who cares for those things that the humanity they created care for themselves. This is a God who has a deep and caring understanding for those things that we, God's people, hold dear.

And yet the miracle at Cana also reveals something else about the relationship between God and ourselves. It says quite clearly that it is God who is in charge and God alone who will decide and who will act. For when Mary informs Jesus that the wine has given out, she receives short shrift from her son and is told that it is none of her business.

Again, embarrassment surrounds this treatment of Mary by Jesus. How can he be so rude to his mother, many ask? However, those who know about these things suggest that Jesus is being nowhere near as harsh as our modern reading of their interaction suggests.

And either way, these words shared between son and mother fall in line with other times that Jesus has made clear that all relationships, no matter what they are, pale into insignificance when compared to our relationship with God. For it is whoever does the will of his Father in heaven who is described by Jesus as being his mother, brothers and sisters, later on in his ministry when told his family wish to see him.

This makes the further and important point that God does not play favourites. All are of equal import when it comes to being loved and cared for by God. Additionally, whoever we are, none of us can bend God to our will, as not even his mother, who may be felt to have some justification in thinking that she could, can do so.

But unsurprisingly from Christ's mother Mary, who as always is a great guide of how to be when it comes to Jesus and being his follower, we learn something else of significance about faith in God here. For we see from Mary that faith requires perseverance and trust.

Even in the face of the less than encouraging words from Jesus, Mary perseveres. This marvellous woman carries on, whether bruised or not by what Jesus has said, using her knowledge to direct others in what to do to receive God's loving presence in their lives. And furthermore, in telling the servants to do whatever Jesus tells them to do, Mary is trusting in him to know what is best and guiding these men to do the same, as he wants her to. And, as we know, the results are amazing.

Through letting God lead the way, the abundance of God is revealed in front of those gathered. A miracle unfolds before their very eyes, and all realize that God is with them. A realization that has the most profound effect upon that other group of people present, the disciples. This produces in them the most wonderful outcome in life, faith in God. For, as described at the end of the miracle, this group of men, having seen the water turned into wine and the glory of God revealed in Jesus, believed in him. It was this miraculous truth about Jesus that saw these men who will become foremost amongst Christ's followers come to faith.

This then is the season that is an Epiphany. It is a season of revelation and realization. A season when what is revealed is no less than the divine, and our place in allowing others to realize this alongside us. For we are now those who can be signs for Jesus. Signs based upon what is revealed not least through the miracle seen at the wedding at Cana. Signs that are people bringing the joy of God

to people's lives. Signs that are those who care like God for people and what is going on in their lives, showing love and compassion not least at times of need. Signs that like Mary persevere in our faith no matter what and trust in God to lead the way, and help lead others in this way as well. Signs that can see others realize as the disciples did, that Jesus is King of all the nations, God's beloved Son, the performer of miracles, the source of our faith, the divine. Signs who, like those disciples, point to Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us, in how we live out our faith each day.


