Genesis 2.4b-9,15-end Psalm 65 Revelation 4 Luke 8.22-25

Calming the storm

What are we to make of the storms raging around us? Unjust structures driven by uncontrollable forces of climate, of autocratic power politics, of negative reactions to incipient mass migration ... and in the Church, crises of finance, of leadership, of reputation - and of simply not knowing how to relate to the surrounding hullabaloo.

There was a time when the Church seemed to have all the answers. And not just the answers. It seemed to have the power, too. In the Middle Ages the Church was God's agent on earth. Power over our eternal fate, over matters of life and death, judgement, good and evil, heaven and hell.

People could hear passages such as these from Genesis and Revelation, if they could understand Latin that is, or they could see them depicted in art if not. And there would probably be nothing in them at odds with their experience of life in a very hierarchical society.

The creation stories of Genesis, with their account of the Fall, provided the backdrop for a whole way of looking at life: an explanation of evil and sin and our need to be saved from the results of our own behaviour.

The images transmitted by the book of Revelation display God's power as a superabundance of every possible symbol of glory. Nothing there runs against life experience in the pre-modern world. In a society dominated by hierarchy, God the super-hierarch makes sense.

That powerful and princely Church of medieval Christendom still echoes down the centuries and reverberates around much of our thinking about the things of God. But successive tides of change came to sweep away much of what once could be taken for granted. Science and reason seemed to render quite obsolete the previous ways of looking at things.

But again, the enlightenment project and its ideas of rational progress are now three hundred years old and have themselves come to be questioned and rejected. So we are more than a little confused about the times we live in. We don't even know what to call them. Theorists simply say what they are not - they are not modern, modern is over, so they are post-modern.

Modern was the age of humanity's big projects to improve the world. Science. Industrial advance. Technology. Liberalism. Socialism. The list goes on of all the things people once thought of as The Answer. They've not necessarily gone away, but they are no longer The Answer. We've seen that as they bring progress, they also bring problems. And the problems somehow always threaten to overwhelm the progress.

We can see this because the technology has brought us an unprecedented, and exponentially growing, amount of information about life, the world and everything. If that melting-pot whips up a storm of boggled-ness in our heads, we are told, maybe Artificial Intelligence will help us to manage things. But no doubt that is bringing us its own new set of problems, too.

All the while the man has been asleep in the bottom of the boat. Does he not know we are adrift and in trouble? Does he not understand the fear, the urgency, the panic? Does he not care if we are overwhelmed?

It is quite possible to read the story of the calming of the storm as a great demonstration of divine power over nature by the man Jesus. But Jesus did not feel called to prove himself in that way. When we come to consider the temptations in the wilderness in two weeks' time, we will see him rejecting that course. This is one non-hierarchical God.

No, the call to calm the storm did not come from God, it came from the disciples. Now, it comes from us. It is perhaps more helpful if we read the story against ourselves.

For it is really about how the disciples felt about Jesus, how dependent they felt about him, how they needed him to bale (bail?) them out. And about how their trust in him failed when tested one windy afternoon on the lake.

Jesus's concern is not with the weather. It is with their attitude - and therefore with *our* attitude). Jesus is asking us to consider what the storm that surrounds us, that confuses us, that frightens us, means in the context of our relationship with him.

Our world is no longer one in which we can take unquestioningly what has been called a 'nature miracle'. But it certainly still is one in which disciples can feel that they are caught in a storm whilst their master slumbers. And it also still is one in which disciples are challenged, called upon and empowered to hold their nerve ... to wait until the situation clears.

That is quite a lot to be going on with, and quite awesome enough for me.




