13th Sunday after Trinity

Joshua 24.1-2a,14-18 Psalm 34.15-end Ephesians 6.11-20 John 6.56-69

What is Christianity about? What would you say if somebody asked you that, if you had to give some account of your beliefs? Being a good Anglican and a vital part of the Lark Valley and North Bury benefice, I'm sure what you'd say would be very orthodox.

Perhaps you'd say something about a God who loved creation into being and continues to love all that is in it, even rebellious humanity, even you and me. And you might then talk about God's love being shown above all in Jesus, and in his life and work and death and resurrection. And about how the Holy Spirit joins that all together and makes it come alive.

The you'd realise you were *really orthodox* because you'd couched your reply in trinitarian terms. Very well done!

But then they come back and ask you: What about the Church? What does the Christian Church do? That is an important question. There are people out there who have a nice warm glow about Christianity, if a bit vague, but don't really see much point in identifying themselves with the Church. It's always getting bad publicity. It's subject to indifference, or scorn, or hostility.

Surely, they say, it's sufficient to relate to God in a lovely sunset, or some other wonder of creation, or in being nice to people. Of course, these things are of great value ... but we need to be clear that they are not sufficient.

So what does the Christian Church do? What is it for? Why do we need it? Then we might answer: It's there to make God's love known to people, to communicate, to express and to enact, to put into practice, what Christ did and does in the world. But that is easier said than done.

It is easier said than done because it means that we have to be Christ. This is why we claim to be the body of Christ. Often, at the introduction to the Peace, we say: "We are the body of Christ. In the one Spirit we were all Baptized into one body. Let us then pursue all that makes for peace and builds up our common life."

Then later, after we have said the Lord's Prayer, whoever is presiding at the

Eucharist breaks the consecrated bread saying: "We break this bread to share in the body of Christ." And we all reply: "Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread." These are important sayings, not to be uttered lightly or taken for granted.

Each year our Sunday gospel readings home in on the synoptic gospels: Matthew, Mark or Luke. This year it is Mark's turn. Yet by now we have gone for five Sundays without hearing from Mark at all. Instead, we have been working our way through Chapter Six of John.

On the last Sunday of July, instead of Mark's account of the feeding of the 5,000, we got John's, and then through all of August, John's follow-up discourse, with Jesus saying: "I am the bread of life" and "the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh."

This might all seem a bit laboured, a bit much. In fact, the first three verses of today's gospel are a repeat of the last three verses of last week's. They overlap.

But this is all done for a reason: these verses are extremely important. They answer that crucial question: What is the Christian Church for? What does it do? Why do we need it? Through John, Jesus says to us: "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them."

This is the Eucharist. This is what the Church has done down the ages. This is what the Church does for us, day by day, week by week, here and now, whenever and wherever the Eucharist is celebrated. This is what makes the people of God. This cannot be done by any other person or organisation.

At the very beginning of his gospel, John has made it clear that Jesus is God's Word – God's communicating, creating, outpouring being. "In the beginning was the Word." And this is to be identified with the man Jesus from Nazareth – a person like us – a walking talking, breathing, eating carpenter. "And the Word became flesh and lived among us."

Now we are being told by this very person: "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them." The word 'flesh' makes a clear connection between Eucharist and Incarnation.

In other words, it connects our action when we celebrate the Eucharist together with the deep and essential foundation of our faith – that Jesus was both divine and human, bridging the divide between God and humanity.

It is a mystery which, in our human fallibility, we can never fully understand, whether in the form of the gift of the person of Jesus, or in the gift of the Eucharist he has left us.

"Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them." To abide, to live in, to be in: this idea crops up time and time again in John's gospel. It has been called 'a relationship of interior presence' and 'mutual indwelling'. The life that the Father shares with the Son passes to the faithful through the Eucharist.

Jesus's words about the bread from heaven reveal something divine, something mysterious of which only the Spirit can supply understanding. This talk of eating flesh and drinking blood is of course highly figurative. But it is intentionally very intense and can hardly fail to suggest the idea of death. Through death Christ becomes the bread of life and blood of salvation to the world. Only a claim to divinity can account for this.

This is tough stuff, and very shocking to Jesus's hearers. Even though Jesus is speaking at Capernaum, very much home ground for him, it makes some his followers leave and drives them away. Talk of divinity and death was decidedly unnerving, and remains so today.

It is interesting to note that a strange Greek expression is used to describe the departure of these unhappy disciples. Literally, it means 'they went away, backwards'. The same term is used at the time of Jesus's betrayal.

All this suggests an element of crisis and gives rise to an important confession of faith by Peter on behalf of all Jesus's followers, including us: "We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God."

It is tough stuff – but it is also rather wonderful. This is why the Eucharist is the great thanksgiving of the Church. And why it answers the question: What is the Church for?

The Church is here to offer thanks to God for Jesus. Everything else follows from that response of thanksgiving. Worship, prayer, service, mission: all are rooted in thanksgiving.

The Eucharist is that thanksgiving in its very essence. It is the Bread of Life and Cup of Heaven. We can never fully understand it, but we need to place ourselves in it, day by day, week by week, year by year, and let it seep into our souls.

Price: £10 for two courses, wine and coffee - a good deal!


